FACTS ABOUT VAPING



History of Electronic Cigarettes

- 1927: Joseph Robinson
- 1965: H.A. Gilbert, Inventor
- 1980s: Vaporized nicotine
- •2000s: Hon Lik, Chinese pharmacist and inventor
- •2006: Introduced to the mass market in the U.S.




What is Vaping?

- Inhaling and exhaling aerosol chemicals, not water vapors, using an electronic cigarette (e-cigarette) or other vaping device
 - Most contain nicotine
 - Claims of being "organic" or "all-natural"
- Vaping devices are also called:
 - E-cigarettes (E-cigs), vape pens, e-hookahs, e-pipes, tanks, mods, vapes, Electronic
 Nicotine Delivery Systems (ENDS)
- Also referred to by brand names:
 - JUUL (JUULing), BO, Blue, and others



Parts of an E-Cigarette



Chemicals in Vaping Solution

- Nicotine decrease adolescent brain development
- Propylene glycol antifreeze, paint solvent
- Formaldehyde disinfectant, embalming fluid
- Acrolein weed killer
- Diacetyl chemical associated with Popcorn lung
- Cancer causing chemicals
- Heavy metals nickel, tin, lead
- Benzene chemical from car exhaust
- And more...




Vaping Devices

- 74-99% are sold at convenience stores and supermarkets
- •52% are supplied by friends and family
- •60% of teens think it only contains flavoring





Cigarette vs. E-Cigarette





Dripping vs. Dabbing

- **Dripping** involves dropping e-cigarette liquid directly onto the hot coils of an e-cigarette which can result in high concentrations of compounds
- **Dabbing** involves superheating substances or flash vaporization concentrated oil







Nicotine Content

Cigarette vs. Vaping products

- •An American tobacco cigarette contains ~ 9mg of nicotine
 - After it's burned/inhaled, only 1 mg of nicotine is absorbed
- Vaping products and e-cigarettes can contain nicotine
 - Each pod (200 puffs) can contain nicotine similar to 1 pack of cigarettes
- The content and nicotine levels in vaping products vary because they are unregulated



Vaping Product Nicotine Content

Example


South Beach Smoke® nicotine content per milliliter of vaping solution:

- No nicotine -0 mg
- Ultra Light 6 mg
- Light 12 mg
- Full Flavored 16 mg
- Bold -24 mg

Note: Based on data from the Monitoring the Future surveys.



Vaping Trend

10 years after the e-cigarette was introduced...

- An additional 3.6 million middle and high school students used ecigarettes
- 48% increase in middle school students
- 78% increase in high school students





Industry Tactics

The tobacco and vaping industries target younger individuals by making their products:

- Sweet
- Cheap
- Easy to get





Cost of Cigarettes

Average cost of a pack of cigarettes in Texas:

- \$7.19 per pack
- \$215 per month (pack-a-day)
- \$2,600 per year





Cost of Vaping

Average cost on Amazon:

- JUUL 4 e-cigarettes + 4 Pods = \$17.95
 - \$4.49 per e-cigarette/pod





Advertising









False Statements

by JUUL

- "much safer than cigarettes" and "FDA would approve it any day"
- "totally safe"
- "... should mention JUUL to his [nicotine-addicted] friend... because that's a safer alternative than smoking cigarettes, and it would be better for the kid to use"
- "FDA was about to come out and say it [JUUL] was 99% safer than cigarettes"

SIGNS AND SYMPTOMS OF VAPING



Signs Vaping is Occurring

- Unexplained Sweet Scent
 - Might be a flavored e-juice
- Unfamiliar Products
 - Unusual pens or USB drives
 - Unfamiliar battery or battery charging device
 - Dropper bottles



Symptoms of Vaping

- Coughing (throat irritation)
- Shortness of breath
- Chest pain
- Fast heart rate
- Fever
- Fatigue
- Nausea
- Vomiting

- Diarrhea
- Weight loss (reduced ability to taste food)
- Dryness of mouth, eyes, skin and lips
- Sensitive or bleeding gums
- Nose or gum bleeds
- Headaches



Onset and Duration

- Symptoms can develop over days, weeks or months
 - Once symptoms appear, the lungs can collapse within minutes
- Gastrointestinal symptoms sometimes precede respiratory symptoms



EFFECTS OF VAPING



Inhaling an Aerosol

- •Inhaling various aerosolized chemicals can harm the lungs
- The lung's function is to take in oxygen and release carbon dioxide
- •Scarred tissue from inhaling chemicals can be irreversible



Effects of Nicotine

- Nicotine damages developing adolescent brain
 - Harm brain's ability to control attention and leaning
 - Addictive
 - Mood disorders
 - Permanent lowering of impulse control (can't resist a temptation/an urge)
 - Decision-making part of the brain
- Due to changes in the brain, quitting is harder for those who start vaping or smoking at a younger age
- Harmful for pregnant women



Centers for Disease Control Findings

- •August 19, 2019
 - 94 cases of severe pulmonary illness related to vaping
 - Average age ~20 years old
 - Male > female
 - 80% history of vaping THC
 - 94% history of vaping 1 week prior to onset
- •September 2019
 - Ban the sale of most flavored E-cigarettes



Vaping Related Lung Damage

- First double lung transplant in the United States due to irreparable damage from vaping
- Patient was a healthy 16-year-old athlete
 - Sept 5: pneumonia
 - Sept 12: intubated then placed on a heart and lung machine
 - October 15: double lung transplant



Effects of Vaping

- Associated with reduced blood flow during exercise and at rest
- Increases heart rate and stiffens arteries
- Decreases good cholesterol (HDL) and increase bad cholesterol (LDL)
- •Long term effects could include:
 - Heart disease
 - Heart attack
 - Stock



EVALI

- E-Cigarette & Vaping Associated Lung Injury
- Symptoms are similar to:
 - Bacterial Pneumonia
 - Viral infections
 - > Respiratory
 - > Gastrointestinal



EVALI

- •October 2019
 - -1,299 cases
 - 26 deaths reported
 - > Median age of death = 49 years (17–75 years)
- •November 2019
 - -2,051 cases (752 more cases in one month)
 - > 163 new cases in 1 week
 - 39 deaths reported (13 more deaths in one month)
 - JUUL mint favor taken off the market (70% of sales)



Potential Toxin

- All 29 lung tissue samples from patients were positive for Vitamin E Acetate
- Vitamin E is not harmful if taken by mouth or used topically on skin





Dipping vs. Dabbing



Essential Oils

- Essential oil pens do not contain nicotine but can still be risky to inhale
- •Essential oils are a volatile organic compound (VOC) when heated to 150-180 degrees F
 - Can convert to abnormal compounds that can be damaging to lungs



CONCLUSIONS



Are E-Cigarettes Safe?

- E-cigarettes are **NOT** safe
 - Contain nicotine and other chemicals
- Secondhand vape is also unsafe
- More research is needed to understand the long-term health effects



Texas Law

- Effective September 1, 2019 Senate Bill 21
 - Legal age to purchase any tobacco-related devices increases from 18 years old to 21 years old
- Tobacco related offense
 - \$72 and tobacco awareness course (parents)
 - \$275 and repeating tobacco awareness course and perform community service
 - \$500 and more
- Minors possessing THC (marijuana) in a vaping device face a felony arrest



Federal Action

- •Congressional Hearing July 2019
 - FDA warned JUUL for marketing their tobacco and other products as *low* or *free*
 - Marketing to youth



Talk With Your Child

- •No "perfect time" to talk
- •Be patient and ready to listen without judgment
- Put yourselves in their situation
- •Be a positive example, open and honest
 - Are you a tobacco user?
- Be ready to answer questions
- Help them make good decisions
- Ask your child what they think



Talk to Your Child as a Trusted Adult

- Ask them what they see and what they think
 - -Have they seen vapes and e-cigarettes
 - -Different Products. Same Dangers." advertisements
- Provide facts about vaping
 - -E-cigarettes often contain nicotine
 - -It is not harmless water vapor
- Tell them the tobacco and vaping industries are targeting the youth to make money and hook them on their products

Code of Conduct



Tobacco Possession / Use (Level III Offense)

Smoking or vaping is not allowed on any SBISD premises or at school-related functions.

Students shall not possess the following related tobacco products and/or smoking paraphernalia, including but not limited to cigarettes, e-cigarettes, cigars, pipes, snuff, or chewing tobacco, smokeless tobacco, vape pens, vape liquids (whether or not they contain tobacco products), or Juul vaporizers. Misdemeanor tickets for minors in possession of alcohol and/or drugs/tobacco on school property may be issued by the SBISD Police Department.



Code of Conduct



Behaviors leading to such action may include, but are not limited to:

- Use/possession of tobacco [see Tobacco Possession/Use, p. C-21];
 For Level III incidents: behaviors should be supported using one or more of the management techniques
- appropriate for the student, the school environment, and the situation:
- Assignment to in-school suspension (ISS); and/or
- Out-of-school suspension (up to three days); and/or
- Assignment to a DAEP (District or Highpoint); and/or
- Certain offenses may result in filing a charge by the SBISD Police Department;
- Special education students—refer to IEP; and §504 students—refer to 504 accommodations;
- A student who is involved in a Level III incident and is suspended or placed in a DAEP is prohibited from attending or participating in school-sponsored or school-related activities.
